ABSTRACT

Increasing demand for getting a berth in good engineering or medical colleges through entrance examinations enhances the growth of private tutoring in India under the guise of Shadow Education (SE) in recent years. Rage for this supplementary coaching at the plus two stage of Indian education system has become very predominant in science stream. Students are running after this system to achieve their golden dream to become doctor or engineer ignoring the objective and spirit of mainstream education. Characteristics and approach of SE at this phase is completely different from other levels. This study was initiated to identify the characteristics and structure of private tutoring at this stage and to locate its positive and negative strengths that has diluted the concept and purpose of main line education. The sample of students for this study was arbitrarily selected from the main stream schools in a town at the plus two level of science stream. The study identifies sixteen attributes in psychological sector of the learners that have negative or positive biases for SE.
